National Night Out Against Crime – Hyrum will be hosting the annual National Night Out Against Crime on Tuesday, August 6th at 6:30 p.m. on the City Square in conjunction with many communities across Utah and the United States. National Night Out, a yearlong community building campaign, is designed to: 1) heighten crime prevention awareness, 2) generate support for, and participation in, local anticrime programs, 3) strengthen neighborhood spirit and police-community partnerships, and 4) send a message to criminals letting them know that neighborhoods are organized and fighting back.

Hyrum will be providing free hamburgers as well as hosting various law enforcement groups as well as other community service providers. These groups will have information available as well as demonstrations.

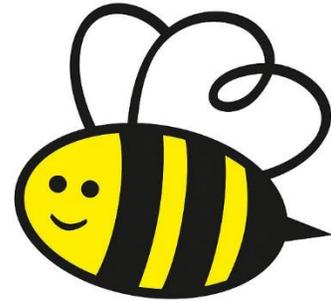

Museum News – Did you know that a group of Hyrum citizens finished building the Elite Hall in August 1915 following a fire that burned a theater, Allgaier's Confectionary, and Unsworth's Store on the corner of Main and 100 West? The South Cache Courier reported that "the greatest event of the season...was the opening of our new dance hall, Monday night August 30th...The beautiful hall in all its newness and freshness, with its glassy floor, its excellent lighting, and splendid music, with the hundreds of beautifully gowned dancers, was a sight long to be remembered." Now, over 100 years later we are beginning to restore that early Twentieth-Century elegance to the hall and are thrilled to be awarded a \$125,000 RAPZ grant from Cache County that will kick-off the restoration. Plans, renderings, and donation information will be available at this year's Fall Harvest Festival on Saturday, September 7th, so be sure to save the date on your calendar now.

Bear River Health Department – The Bear River Health Department now provides services at a more convenient location for clients who live on the south end of Cache Valley. Clients no longer have to travel through town to access immunizations, WIC, non-Medicaid mental health counseling, diabetes prevention classes, senior fall prevention courses, youth advocacy activities and other public health services. This new beautiful building is located at 635 South 100 East Logan, next to the Springhill Suites Marriott. Hours are 8:00 a.m. – 6:00 p.m. Monday through Thursday and 8:00 a.m. – 1:00 p.m. on Fridays.

Storm Water - Compost yard waste and sweep grass clippings out of street gutters after mowing. Most people don't think of grass clippings and leaves as possible pollutants but they can when they end up in waterways through our storm drain system. These materials can contribute nutrients such as nitrogen and phosphorous, which cause unwanted and uncontrolled growth of algae and aquatic weeds in the waterways. Too much algae is harmful to streams and lakes. It blocks sunlight and prevents other plants from growing. When it dies and decays, it also takes much needed oxygen away from fish. Mulch leaves by running the lawnmower over them and leaving the shredded leaves and grass in the lawn. This also adds needed nutrients back to your lawn minimizing the need of added fertilizers. Be sure to sweep up any leaves and grass from driveways and sidewalks so they don't end up down the storm drain.
